Congratulations, Class of 2022! District's 100th Commencement

With 229 spring graduates, the Class of 2022 celebrated Vandalia-Butler's 100th commencement of the consolidated school district.

Superintendent O'Leary reflected on the group's time at Butler High School.

"The tornado to end your freshman year, the nine-week shutdown of your sophomore year and the fight for normalcy your junior and senior years. You did not have one 'normal' high school year, but here you are. You have achieved so much collectively and individually, despite having every excuse to fail," he said.

Through all of the trials and tribulations, the Class of 2022 proved to be resilient, earning a record high of \$11,888,797 in post-secondary scholarships.

New Sidewalks to Improve Students' Safety

New sidewalks on the north side of Stonequarry Road, between the Vandalia corporation limit and Morton Middle School, are on their way. Butler Township is finalizing agreements with property owners for the installation of the sidewalks.



The new sidewalks will start at the corner of Peters Pike, connecting the walking path in Vandalia to the east and the Morton Middle School to the west. This connection will allow students to walk safely to school and may potentially reduce the number of bus routes needed.

The project is a joint effort involving Butler Township, the City of Vandalia and the Vandalia-Butler City School District.

"All the entities have been dedicated to making it happen," said Butler Township Administrator Erika Vogel.

The township is hiring a contractor and plans to complete construction before the start of the 2022-2023 school year.








3,000 Aviators Gather to Close Out School Year

Big and Bold, Mural Celebrates City

With help from a talented artist and a host of community members, a colorful mural is now part of Vandalia's downtown streetscape.

Support for the \$10,000 project – located at 115 National Rd. – came through a \$4,250 grant from the Montgomery County Arts and Cultural District, administered by Culture Works, and funding from the Vandalia Arts Council. Vandalia Rental donated the use of a lift.

The project was inspired by residents and stakeholders who participated in developing the Vandalia Comprehensive Plan in 2020.

"Residents and stakeholders felt strongly about enhancing the city's business corridor," said Assistant City Manager Amber Holloway. "The final report recommends that the city create a public art program on blank walls and prioritize those walls that will have the most impact on public spaces. This mural does just that."

The artwork celebrates Vandalia's designation as a Bee City, USA, showcasing bees, honeycomb and flowers. It was designed and created by Tiffany Clark of the Mural Machine.

More than 50 people came to help paint the mural on Community Paint Day, May 14.

"People of all ages and abilities came and grabbed a paintbrush to be a part of this project," Holloway said. "It was gratifying to see so many excited about this mural."

City's Road Resurfacing Underway

The City of Vandalia is investing \$1 million in resurfacing 26 stretches of roadway as part of its annual resurfacing program. The overall project includes an additional \$400,000 in concrete repairs to curbs and sidewalks and handicap ramp installations at intersections that do not have them.

"A number of factors go into determining which streets are resurfaced," said Director of Public Service Rob Cron. "We prioritize those streets in the worst shape."

City officials also consider planned utility projects. "If a water or sewer project is planned in the next few years, we wait until it's completed," Cron said. "We don't want to dig up a brand-new street."

Vandalia's "Safe and Stable" levy pays for the street resurfacing program.

"In 2010, voters approved a quarter of one percent income tax to be used for police, fire and streets," Cron said. "The income tax allows us to resurface streets and repair concrete without assessing property owners."

Cron reminds residents to be patient while crews are working.

"We know many will have limited driveway access for a time," he said. "We also know everyone will love the end results."
