Well Testing Set to Begin for Water Contamination


Montgomery County – which is partnering with Butler Township to address the water contamination issue – has entered into a contract with the environmental consulting firm Bennett and Williams Inc. to develop and administer a sampling program.

This program will provide free well testing to residents within the Recommended Well Sampling Area, as defined by the Ohio Department of Health and the Ohio EPA. (Check the color-coded map at butlertownship.com/community/water-contamination-issue to see the different designations.)

Bennett and Williams scheduled two public meetings to share information about the health effects of consuming water contaminated by PFAS and to help people sign up for free well testing.

Links to those meetings, health effects information and treatment options and/or bottled water alternatives will be available on the township's website.

Even if your residence is not in the sampling



area, you can access these resources to learn more about the issue.

The last day to sign up for free well testing is Oct. 15, 2022.

Making Benchwood Station Even Better

Benchwood Station – informally known as Miller Lane – is Butler Township's business district and a key amenity for township residents and travelers. Its restaurants, hotels and retail outlets attract more than 20,000 vehicles every day.

Benchwood Station is also an important revenue generator for the township, providing more than \$2 million in taxes annually, through hotel tax, Joint Economic Development Zone (JED-Z) income tax and Tax Increment Financing (TIF) districts. These revenue sources provide funding for township operations and services, and improvements within the district.

In 2021, the township announced a feasibility study to make Benchwood Station an even greater asset. Many recommendations from the study are under review, from intersection and overpass improvements, to landscaping, lighting, street trees and branding. Also being considered is a continuous northbound turn on Miller Lane from 1-75 and a roundabout at Miller Lane and Maxton Road.

But the plans are by no means set in stone, and the township will continue to meet with stakeholders to share ideas and obtain input. Once alignment is achieved, and the project scope is firmed up, the township will move forward with final design and engineering. Because Benchwood Station is such an important part of the township, the goal is to get it right, rather than get it fast.

Utility Extension Underway in Vandalia

The city of Vandalia is extending water and sewer services to an area west of Airport Access Road, along Dog Leg Road and US 40. The project will open 470 acres of real estate for commercial development.

"The land was rezoned in 2021 to open the area for commercial development," said Vandalia Public Service Director Rob Cron. "For the land to be developed, however, we need to supply water and sewer services."

The project will be completed in two phases. Engineering for Phase 1 was completed last year, and crews are now at work to extend water and sewer lines situated at Stonequarry Crossings under the Airport Access Road to Dog Leg Road.

Phase 2 of the project is still in the planning stages.

"Engineering is being done right now on Phase 2, which will extend water and sewer lines down to Union Airpark Boulevard on the south side of US 40," Cron explained. "We have a consultant on board to design it."

When Phase 2 is complete, the city will be able to provide service to all Vandalia properties west of Airport Access Road.
