Items on this evening's Council Meeting agenda

Resolution: 2024 Copier Replacement and Lease Agreement – The city's 60-month equipment and service lease for eleven multifunction copiers with US Bank and Prosource has expired. To maintain uninterrupted copy, scan, fax, and printing services, the IT Department issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for a new 60-month, fair market value lease and service agreement, aligning with our commitment to fiscal sustainability and efficient technology. The RFP, published on May 6, 2024, garnered bids from seven companies, with evaluations focusing on cost, reliability, user feedback, support, and usability. After reviewing bids and visiting showrooms, IT Manager Davey is recommending the acceptance of Perry ProTECH's proposal of \$1,835.04 per month, which offers familiar Konica Minolta copiers and the advantage of a local office in Vandalia. Therefore, IT Manager Davey recommends awarding the "2024 Copier Lease and Service Agreement" to Perry ProTECH, Inc. and authorizing the city to enter into a new 60-month lease.

Resolution: VPD Patrol Vehicle Equipment – Vandalia City Council authorized the Division of Police to purchase three new Ford Police Interceptor Utility patrol vehicles in 2023 for manufacturing and delivery in 2024. The Division of Police budgeted \$70,000 for the purchase of equipment and upfitting for these new patrol vehicles in 2024. While some equipment is transferable from the outgoing patrol vehicles, some new equipment is not transferable and will need purchased and installed. K.E. Rose provided a quote of \$53,630.84 for the purchase of new equipment and installation of equipment in these new patrol vehicles. K.E. Rose informed VPD that the equipment could be ordered and installed within a few weeks once purchased.

When checking with several other vendors in southwest Ohio who install equipment on police patrol vehicles, these vendors could not provide equipment quotes and/or were months out on scheduling patrol vehicles for equipment installation. K.E. Rose has been awarded the contract for the installation of equipment on VPD patrol vehicles for over a decade and provides quality service and workmanship. They typically have the same technician work on VPD patrol vehicles and are quick to correct any issues or problems with patrol vehicle equipment. Chief Althouse is requesting Council to authorize the waive of competitive bidding and permit VPD to contract with K.E. Rose for the purchase of new patrol vehicle equipment and complete the installation of patrol vehicle equipment in the new patrol vehicles at a price not to exceed \$58,000.

Resolution: Golf Irrigation Project Contract Award – Bids were publicly opened for the **Cassel Hills Golf Course Irrigation System** project on Tuesday, May 14, 2024. This project will allow for the replacement of the 50-year-old golf course irrigation system at Cassel Hills Golf Course. This project will take place in conjunction with the Golf Course Irrigation Pump Station and Control Panel Replacement Project at Cassel Hills as the pump station and control panel moves the water from the wellfield to the irrigation system on the golf course. The project was advertised in the Daily Court Reporter on April 26 and May 3, 2024. Seven (7) contractors attended a mandatory pre-bid meeting on May 2, 2024, and four (4) contractors submitted bids for the project. Bids ranged from \$1,335,797.40 to \$2,382,539.96. Our consultant on this project, Technical Choice LLC, estimate range for the project was \$1.85 million. Technical Choice performed a thorough review to determine if the bid proposals met specifications and also contacted project reference list contacts to determine the quality of work performed on similar projects. Technical Choice recommends that we respectfully decline the low bid from Oheil Site Solutions as they do not meet the prequalification criteria and are not qualified for this scale or type of project. Therefore, Director Clark is recommending the bid for the irrigation system project be awarded to Commercial Irrigation Inc. of East Peoria, Illinois at their bid price of \$1,887,896.00, allowing for up to 10% of the original bid for contingency items that may arise during construction.

Resolution: Golf Pumping Control System Contract Award – Bids were publicly opened for the **Cassel Hills Golf Course Pump Station and Control Panel** project on Tuesday, May 14, 2024. This project will allow for the replacement of the golf course irrigation system pump station and control panel at Cassel Hills Golf Course. This project will take place in conjunction with the Irrigation System replacement project at Cassel Hills as the pump station and

control panel moves the water from the wellfield to the irrigation system on the golf course. Two (2) contractors attended a mandatory pre-bid meeting on May 2, 2024, and both contractors submitted bids for the project. Bids ranged from \$142,709.51 to \$248,738. Our consultant on this project, Technical Choice LLC, estimate range for the project was \$180,000 to \$200,000. Technical Choice performed a thorough review to determine if the low bid meets all specifications and also contacted project reference list contacts to determine the quality of work performed on similar projects. Based on the bid proposal review and reference responses provided, Technical Choice recommends that we move forward with Pro Pump & Controls of Shelbyville, KY at their bid price of \$142,709.51, allowing for up to 10% of the original bid for contingency items that may arise during construction.

Resolution: VDC Donation – At the May 20, 2024, Council meeting Council passed Resolution 24-R-37 approving a Management Agreement for Interim Operation Under Liquor License at the Casel Hills Golf Course. The Resolution authorized the City Manager to enter into an agreement with DIF INC. whereby that company would operate under the City's liquor permit and manage the food and beverage activities at the Cassel Hills Clubhouse under the name The Approach. Two versions of the agreement were presented to Council at the May 20 meeting, one specifically provided that the agreement would be contingent on the Vandalia Development Corporation providing funds to DIF, the other did not contain that provision. Council approved the version without the contingency allowing the project to timely move forward without a financial commitment from the City being proposed or implied. The City Manager executed the agreement as directed but it has not been signed by DIF INC. DIF INC, subsequently submitted an application to the Vandalia Development Corporation (VDC) seeking a loan or grant in the amount of \$50,000. The VDC voted 4-1 in favor of a zero percent \$50,000 loan from the VDC but noted that in doing so, the VDC may fall short of providing other grants that it previously committed. As a result, the VDC is now seeking a donation from City Council. At this point in time, it is not clear if DIF Inc will continue with opening The Approach food service operation without the funds from the VDC, or if the VDC will provide the funds to DIF INC without Council agreeing to this donation. It is important to note that once City Council provides funds to the VDC, it may use those funds for any matter under its corporate purpose.

Ordinance: Supplemental – Mrs. Leiter will discuss and request approval of the following supplemental appropriation Ordinance for the following reasons:

Monday, July 15, 2024, Items:

Resolution: Donation of 31 North Perry Street - The City acquired the parcel at 31 North Perry Street in February of 2010 and demolished the existing structure as part of a blight abatement. Ever since, this lot has sat as a City mowed

lot. Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dayton has expressed interest in this property for another house build site. Director Borton recommends the City donate this property to Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dayton as an act of partnering for a home build.

Discussion Items:

Engine 1 Fire Truck Repair – Under \$50k – A rust/corrosion issue in the rear suspension, frame, fuel tank, and water tank mounts of the Division of Fire’s 2008 Pierce engine was identified during a recent preventative maintenance visit to the Public Works garage. During that visit, our mechanics discovered and became concerned about the amount of rust (corrosion) on the frame and recommended that we reach out to the manufacturer to see if this issue rose to the level of a frame warranty claim.

The manufacturer (Pierce Mfr.), through our local dealer Atlantic, has determined that the frame is still in good operational condition with no significant holes/weak areas in the frame that would require a frame rail replacement. However, they do believe that the frame needs to be de-scaled and re-painted with rust proofing to slow the process and prevent us from developing a corrosion issue that would threaten the strength of the frame.

Furthermore, the fuel tank and the support bands for the water tank are seriously corroded and need to be replaced. Atlantic, the local dealer, says they need \$39,275.00 to complete the repairs. Chief Follick is recommending the approval of a not exceed amount of \$40,000. This “not to exceed amount” is needed to cover the cost of parts that may be damaged as they disassemble the rear end, the vendor has indicated in their quote that there could be severely corroded parts that they will not be able to salvage. This is an emergency repair and will require a supplemental appropriation to the Division of Fire’s O&M Vehicle Maintenance line.

We feel that this repair is the only way to ensure that corrosion on the frame or suspension down the road will be covered by the manufacturer’s warranty. This engine is due to be replaced in 2033,

Ordinance – First Reading:

Ordinance 24-14: 2023 Codified Update - This ordinance approves the editing and inclusion of certain ordinances and resolutions that have been passed by Council since the last update of the Codified Ordinances. This update will codify all pertinent legislation passed by Council during 2023, as well as incorporating amendments to the Ohio Revised Code.

Ordinance – Emergency:

Ordinance 24-10: Land Acquisition Note - Stonequarry Crossing - The Land Acquisition Note issued for the acquisition of land for the Stonequarry Crossing development matures on July 24, 2024. The total amount due is \$1,399,000 in principal plus interest. The 2024 Budget included an interest payment amount of \$95,000. The maturity date on the new note (\$1,399,000) will be in July of 2025. The debt is scheduled to be paid in full in 2036.

Ordinance 24-11: Bond Anticipation Note -Fire Engine 2016 BAN & Fire Ladder Truck 2021 BAN - The Fire Engine 2016 Bond Anticipation Note issued for a fire engine matures on August 21, 2024. This note was combined with the Fire Ladder Truck 2021 BAN in order to save on the costs of issuance. The total remaining amount due on the note is \$1,241,000 (Fire Engine \$144,000; Fire Ladder Truck \$1,097,000) plus interest. The amount of the principal payment for the Fire Engine is \$48,000, and \$140,000 for the Fire Ladder Truck. The 2024 budget includes a pay down amount of \$48,000 on the outstanding principal due for the Fire Engine, and \$140,000 for the Fire Ladder Truck, plus an interest payment of \$63,425. The maturity on the new note (Fire Engine \$96,000; Fire Ladder Truck \$957,000) will be in August of 2025. The debt on the Fire Engine is scheduled to be paid in full in 2026, and year 2031 for the Fire Ladder Truck.
