The Blue Letter

July 8, 2023

Honorable Mayor Herbst & Esteemed City Councilmembers:

"We are not victims of our situation. We are the architects of it." -Simon Sinek

We are leveraging ~\$10.7 million in external funding (e.g., grants, land donations), value engineering, and creative thinking to improve quality of life in Vandalia through top-tier public services. We have new utilities installed on Foley Dr. Our teammates are enjoying modern and up-to-date tools and equipment to improve how we do business. An extensive sewer lining project is underway in Taylorsville Metro Park through Tri-Cities after a sanitary sewer collapse a few years back. Public Works Technician Bill Miles and the team are installing new smart water meters every day. New concrete and asphalt are going in around town in accordance with our 10-year plan. We are diligently reviewing architect submittals for our new public works facility - and I will be encouraging active and extensive employee input with our architects to build "ownership", to optimize the use of space, to make us more efficient, and to ensure that we are ready maintain our equipment, hundreds of miles of horizontal utilities, and 210 lane miles of roadways over the next 50 years. As a team, we are working through the Parks & Recreation Master Plan as a guide to help people extend their warranty on wellness and live to be 100 years old. We've improved our capital planning process and have honed our debt forecasting and enterprise funds to ensure fiscal sustainability, while building trust and confidence through transparency. We recently presented a traffic study count to City Council showing our efforts to divert truck traffic to Airport Access Rd. instead of down US-40 is working. Next week, I believe that I will be meeting with the Ohio Legislative Services Commission to continue our pursuit of a legislative prohibition of through truck traffic on US-40. This week, we kicked off our downtown market study, and I am working to set up stakeholder interviews with our consultant later this month. Director Leiter reports that the state has issued a clean audit report for the City of Vandalia, NAWA, and Tri-Cities Wastewater Authority. Sergeant Andrew Wehner has been sworn-in, and I look forward to celebrating his success at his ceremonial swear-in at the next meeting of City Council. I am also excited to see the engineering stage of the Cassel Hills Golf Course continue to advance. As a team, we are honing and updating policies to meet the needs of our teammates, the community, and our organization.

I would like to commend Communications Manager Rich Hopkins and the team on the quality of our communications and the incorporation of our brand. The addition of the MyVandalia App, the MyVandalia magazine, and the quality of our social media correspondence helps to showcase the professionalism of our organization, and the quality of this community.

As Chief Follick has shared with the Fire Division, and our Senior Staff, "We will not celebrate mediocre."

Let's continue to push our teammates to be active learners, to anticipate pinch points, and to provide solutions at every level of government and interaction with the public. We are interested in building leaders and helping our teammates move up through the ranks with purposeful professional development so that they can build on our











<u>great traditions</u>. Over the last few legislative cycles, we have prepared our foundation. We have taken strategic actions to provide opportunities that could bring sit-down restaurants, strong single family housing options, and economic development opportunities that could yield a major increase in our manufacturing workforce with just a

few trucks each day.

Now is the time to build on our momentum.

MyVandalia Magazine: The next edition of the MyVandalia Magazine will begin to arrive at mailboxes on or around July 28th.

CommUNITY Newsletter: Our joint Community Newsletter is in the final stages of editing and should arrive in mailboxes by the end of this month.

Revenue: YTD June 30, 2023, overall Income tax revenue is up 13.73% (\$1,365,585) from 2022. Withholding tax is up YTD 10.81% (\$791,173); individual tax is up YTD 10.94% (\$116,519); Business net profit tax is up YTD 29.35% (\$457,893). The amount of income tax revenue budgeted for 2023 is \$18,470,500. The amount collected YTD was \$11,309,456 and is 22.46% higher than the estimated YTD amount based on the budget.

Ernst Concrete Corporate Office: Work is progressing on the Ernst Corporate Office Facility at 993 Falls Creek Drive. Footers have been poured and utility work is in progress.

Splashtacular: The first Summer Splashtacular event will take place on Tuesday, July 11 from noon – 2:00pm at the Sports Complex. The Parks and Recreation Department and Division of Fire partner to provide this free activity. There will be a food truck at the July 11 event as well. The remaining Splashtacular event will take place on July 18 in Robinette Park and July 25 at the Sports Complex.



Electric Aggregation: Vandalia residents will receive new information regarding the electric aggregation program this week and next week. The Miami Valley Communications Council (MVCC) aggregation group, of which Vandalia is a member, has received a negotiated rate of 6.57 cents per kWh, which is substantially lower than the standard AES rate and lower than the rate in surrounding communities (including Dayton and Butler Township). This rate, provided by Energy Harbor of Akron, will be effective through December, 2025. The new rate will appear on the October 2023 bill. All Vandalia residents who are eligible to join the collective should receive the letter



sometime in the next week. Residents not currently in a special pricing plan will automatically be included in this aggregation collective. Those wishing to optout should do so by July 21, 2023. Specific opt-out instructions are included in the MVCC Community Electric Aggregation Notification.

The MVCC has scheduled three open house events to speak with residents from any of the 14 participating communities. The first open house, which is also the closest to Vandalia, will be held on Thursday, July 13, from 6:30 - 8:30 p.m. at the Meadowbrook of Clayton Clubhouse, 6001 Salem Avenue. A second open house is scheduled for Monday, July 17, 2023, at the Charles I. Lathrem Senior Center, 2900 Glengarry Drive, Kettering, from 6:30 - 8:30 p.m. A third open house is also scheduled for Tuesday, July 18, 2023, at the Sinclair Community College Centerville Campus, 5800 Clyo Road, from 5 - 7 p.m.

Cassel Hills Swimming Pool: Kudos to Director Steve Clark, Superintendent Jeff Kreill and Pool Manager Aaron Baker. My family attends frequently so I have been able to see the improvement firsthand since 2021. Our team has received great feedback regarding the administration of Cassel Hills pool in 2022 and 2023. The City made some drastic changes to the admissions policy this year. I plan to have Director Clark provide a brief update at the next meeting of City Council to ensure that everyone is informed of and understands how these changes and the weather are contributing to cost recovery. We also have some ideas that should help this continue to be an effective strategy for ensuring that Cassel Hills pool remains a great family environment for our residents. Golf Irrigation Project: Golf Superintendent Marty Szturm continues to work on the irrigation system on a regular basis, repairing leaks and replacing parts. Marty is currently working with Technical Choice, LLC on the preliminary design of a new irrigation system. The design should be completed by the end of the summer which will allow us to bid out the irrigation system project this fall.

Senior Center Attendance: For the period of June 20 to July 3 there were 826 people pass through the doors of the Senior Center, including evenings and weekends. There were 10 days in which the facility was rented during this period.

Commercial Truck Traffic: We have installed "No Right Turn" signs for trucks that exceed 50 feet in length at three intersections on the west side of the City. Signs were installed at the intersections of Fieldstone Way and Peters Pike, Capstone Way and Peters Pike, and Peters Pike and National Road. This is part of our continued effort to mitigate the commercial truck traffic on National Road through the City. This

action could reduce eastbound truck traffic on US-40 by approximately 30%. We are also in the process of installing 31 signs on Industrial Park Drive and Scholz Drive prohibiting parking from 9:00 pm to 5:00 am. This action is the result of feedback from local businesses in the corridor.

During the past two weeks, VPD officers made 18 traffic stops on commercial motor vehicles for traffic violations. These stops resulted in two traffic citations, 10 written warnings and six verbal warnings while working 16 additional enforcement hours.

Intrado Phone System: During the week of June 28, technicians were on-site to install the new Intrado phone system; the previous having been destroyed during the 2022 Justice Center flood. Thanks to IT staff for their additional assistance.

Foley / Enola Reconstruction Project: The final course of asphalt has been installed on Foley & Enola Drives. Topsoil has been installed to all of the disturbed areas. The final seeding is all that remains to be completed on the project. Double Jay Construction has done a great job accommodating and working with our residents throughout

the project.

Dog Leg Rd. Utility Extension Project Phase I: The Dog Leg Road Utility project is very near completion. The only items remaining is the fence installation and the electric service to the sanitary sewer lift station.

Municipal Center Security Project: Midwest Security will begin the installation of the door access controls on July 18th. This will involve running cables and modifying doors.

Concrete Replacement: Finfrock Construction continues to move along with our concrete repair project. The rain has delayed some of the work, but they are making progress. They are performing demo work and preparing forms in the Larry Avenue and Waller Avenue area. Final concrete pours and restoration work is being completed on Roxana and Donora Drives.

Airport Access Rd. Northbound Bridge Deck Rehabilitation Project: Brumbaugh Construction has completed the first half of the Airport Access Road bridge deck rehabilitation. Traffic has been shifted over to the new surface and they are performing the hydro demolition of the other half this week.

Clyde / Cyril Reconstruction Project Engineering: City Engineer Ben Borton, Engineering / GIS Tech Chad Baughman and Director Cron performed the field survey work for the Clyde Pl. and Cyril Ct. Reconstruction design. Mr. Baughman is currently adding this information to the construction drawing so that final design can be completed. We plan to have this project out for bid in late summer or early fall. Director Cron and Mr. Baughman secured a \$400,000 Ohio Public Works Commission grant for this project.

Municipal Refuse and Recycling Collection Bid: We will be opening bids for our Municipal Refuse and Recycling collection on July 28th and have this information for discussion at the next study session.

Public Works Facility: The City received a statement of qualifications from 12 firms for the engineering and design of our new Public Works Facility. We will be reviewing all of the submittals and developing a short list to bring in to interview.

Vegetation Control: We are continuing with our vegetation control along and in our roadways. Curb lines on our main roadways and all neighborhoods north of National Road have been completed.

Work Zone Safety Training: Public Works employees attended a "Work Zone Safety" training held by MVRMA. They also attended a trench safety and competent person training that was a requirement of the \$12,000 grant we received for the new trench shoring equipment we purchased earlier this year.

Tandem Axle Truck: We took delivery of the single axle cab & chassis from Rush Trucking that we ordered back in March of 2022. It is ready to be taken to KE Rose for the upfitting of the dump body and snow & ice equipment. KE Rose is nearing the completion of the upfitting of our tandem axle truck that was ordered in late 2021. We just

took delivery of that vehicle earlier this year.

- 2. The compilation team and auditors from Plattenburg and Associates completed the 2022 audit and annual report. We received notification from the Auditor of State's Office that the 2022 audits for the City of Vandalia, Tri-Cities and NAWA were accepted and require no modifications.
- 3. I am working with Chris Franzmann and Andy Brossart on the upcoming new bond debt issuance for phase 2 of the utility extension project.
- 4. I attended a NAWA Special meeting to discuss unexpected expenditures regarding pump and motor repairs to wells #4 and #5.
- 5. The Land Acquisition Note issued for the acquisition of land for the Stonequarry Crossing development will mature on July 26, 2023. **This issuance scheduled and budgeted is a renewal of existing debt, and NOT an issuance of new debt.** The total amount due is \$1,399,000 in principal plus interest. The maturity date on the new note (\$1,399,000) will be in July of 2024. The debt is scheduled to be paid in full in 2036.

- For the period of June 20 to July 3 there were 826 people pass through the doors of the Senior Center, including evenings and weekends. There were 10 days in which the facility was rented during this time period.

FACILITY MAINTENANCE DIVISION

- We welcomed two new Maintenance Technicians to our Parks and Recreation team with Ethan Whitmer starting on June 21 and Drew Burghardt on June 26. Both have hit the ground running and are quickly getting oriented to our processes. We are very happy to have them join our team.
- Mark Collins also was able to have Officer Wehner and Sgt. Lawson provide Run, Hide, Fight training to the evening custodial employees on Tuesday June 20th.
- o Banners for the VRC parking lot light poles have arrived and will be installed in the next week or so.

Development & Engineering Services

The final course of asphalt has been installed on Foley & Enola Drives. Topsoil has been installed to all of the disturbed areas. The final seeding is all that remains to be completed on the project. I would like to thank all of the residents within the project area for their patience throughout the project and our contractor, Double Jay Construction, for their work and accommodating the residents as well.

The Dog Leg Road Utility project is very near completion. The only items remaining is the fence installation and the electric service to the sanitary sewer lift station.

Finfrock Construction continues to move along with our concrete repair project. The rain has delayed some of the work, but they are making progress. They are performing demo work and preparing forms in the Larry Avenue and Waller Avenue area. Final concrete pours and restoration work is being completed on Roxana and Donora Drives.

Brumbaugh Construction has completed the first half of the Airport Access Road bridge deck rehabilitation. Traffic has been shifted over to the new surface and they are performing the hydro demolition of the other half this week.

Ben Borton, Chad Baughman and I performed the field survey work for the Clyde Pl. and Cyril Ct. Reconstruction design. Chad is currently adding this information to the construction drawing so that final design can be completed. We plan to have this project out for bid in late summer or early fall. We have received and you have signed the final agreement with the Ohio Public Works Commission securing our \$400,000 grant for the project.

We will be opening bids for our Municipal Refuse and Recycling collection on July 28th and have this information for discussion at the July City Council Study Session.

We received Statement of Qualifications from 12 firms for the engineering and design of our new Public Works Facility. We will be reviewing all of the submittals and developing a short list to bring in to interview

Final inspections continue in the Redwood Development. Approximately 12-14 of the units are now occupied.

Work is progressing on the Ernst Corporate Office Facility at 993 Falls Creek Drive. Footers have been poured and utility work is in progress.

Demo of the existing structure has been completed at the future site of the Sheetz facility at 3250 Benchwood Drive. The site has been cleared and prepped for construction. We are still awaiting their lot consolidation plat for their building permit to be issued.

Public Works

We have installed "No Right Turn" signs for trucks that exceed 50 feet in length at three intersections on the west side of the City. Signs were installed at the intersections of Fieldstone Way and Peters Pike, Capstone Way and Peters Pike, and Peters Pike and National Road. See attached map. This is part of our continued effort to mitigate the commercial truck traffic on National Road through the City.

We are also in the process of installing 31 signs on Industrial Park Drive and Scholz Drive prohibiting parking from 9:00pm to 5:00am.

We assisted with the traffic control, "No Parking" signs and barricades for the Star Spangled Celebration at the Sports Complex.

We put up and took down the American Flags in honor on Independence Day and the banners for the Star Spangled Celebration along National Road.

Our crews located and reconnected the water service to the drinking fountain in Robinette Park.

We are continuing with our vegetation control along and in our roadways. Curb lines on our main roadways and all neighborhoods north of National Road have been completed.

We repaired a watermain break on Bay Brooke Court last Monday evening. The main had to be completed shut down to make the repair, so we issued a boil advisory for the affected residents until sample results were returned.

Our water meter replacement program continues to move along at a steady pace. Bill Miles has been installing new inside meters every day. Other crews have been installing the meters in pits as time permits. Per a new EPA requirement we are mandated to do a complete survey of every water service on our system by October of 2024, to list water line material. The service is on the public side and private side of the meter. We have been documenting this on each meter replacement.

The Attica Water Tower is now back in service after the inspection and cleaning of the tower as part of our maintenance contract.

We performed 273 utility locates in the month of June as part of the 811 program.

We reset a curb stop box on Taylorsview Drive that the property owner's tree had grown into. The property owner had the tree removed and we reset the box.

The entire department attended a "Work Zone Safety" training held by MVRMA. They also attended a trench safety and competent person training that was a requirement of the \$12,000 grant we received for the new trench shoring equipment we purchased earlier this year.

We took delivery of the single axle cab & chassis from Rush Trucking that we ordered back in March of 2022. It is ready to be taken to KE Rose for the upfitting of the dump body and snow & ice equipment. KE Rose is nearing the completion of the upfitting of our tandem axle truck that was ordered in late 2021. We just took delivery of that vehicle earlier this year.

Jake Hayslett and Ben Borton attended the NAWA Technical Committee meeting during this period.

- 1. During the past two weeks, VPD officers made 18 traffic stops on commercial motor vehicles for traffic violations. These stops resulted in two traffic citations, 10 written warnings and six verbal warnings while working 16 additional enforcement hours.
- 2. Detectives charged a 64-year-old Dayton man with Petty Theft. The suspect stole various items from Kroger and was issued a misdemeanor summons.
- 3. During the week of June 28, technicians were on-site to install the new Intrado phone system; the previous having been destroyed during the 2022 Justice Center flood. Thanks to IT staff for their additional assistance.
- 4. On June 28 and 29, Lt. Sucher assisted Englewood Police Department with their interview panel for their current sergeant promotional process.
- 5. CPO Wehner provided "Run, Hide, Fight" training for Parks & Recreation employees at the Recreation Center on June 29.
- 6. On June 29, VPD hosted a "Coffee with First Responders" event at the Vandalia Library. VFD, BTPD, BTFD, and OSP also attended. The coffee and drinks were donated by the library while VPD provided the donuts. Thank you to all who attended and the library for hosting this event. Thirty-six people attended which is the most we have seen at a coffee event. We look forward to doing this again.



- 7. Detectives charged a 32-year-old Dayton woman with Grand Theft (credit cards). The suspect stole a purse containing various credit cards and bank cards belonging to an employee at Culver's.
- 8. Detectives charged an 18-year-old Vandalia woman with Disrupting Public Services after she broke the house phone that her grandmother was trying to use to call 911 while they were involved in a Domestic Violence incident.
- 9. Detectives recently investigated the Theft of a Jeep Grand Cherokee Trackhawk from a business on Little York Road. The Dayton Police Department recovered the Trackhawk from a resident in Dayton. Information from the recovery of the stolen vehicle led to the confession and arrest of a 17-year-old male from Dayton, Ohio.
- 10. On June 30, Lieutenant Walker and I attended a meeting with the Law Director along with representatives from DES and VFD to discuss the issues with a local hotel that previously had its permit revoked. We discussed the issues that still have yet to be addressed and a possible agreement for the court litigation addressing this public nuisance.
- 11. Lieutenants Walker and Sucher met with Air Show officials on July 1 to determine additional signage and some slight route changes related to the new general admission parking entrance on Engle Road.
- 12. VPD officers worked the Star-Spangled Celebration on July 3 at the Sports Complex. There were no serious issues or incidents during this annual celebration and it was great to see so many of our residents out to enjoy the music and fireworks display. We assisted with traffic direction at the conclusion of the fireworks display and the park cleared out quickly with minimal traffic delays on surrounding roadways.
- 13. The Vandalia-Butler Optimist Club held its 27th annual Freedom Tour bike ride at the Vandalia Sports Complex on July 4. This year saw nearly 550 cyclists participate in one of the three rides. VPD assisted with traffic control at major intersections to provide safety for cyclists crossing National Road and North Dixie Drive. This event highlights our community with cyclists from the tri-state area and benefits the students and school district with funds raised for scholarships and school programs.
- 14. We were proud to witness the City Manager administer the oath of office to promote Andrew Wehner to the position of Sergeant on July 5. Sgt. Wehner will be assigned to the relief schedule on road patrol after a short field training program over the next week. His ceremonial oath of office for his promotion will occur at the July 17 Council meeting.
- 15. You and I conducted second round interviews with public safety specialist applicants this week. Four candidates passed the interview process and will qualify for the eligibility list.

How is my community able to choose a certified electric generation supplier on my behalf?

Under government aggregation, local officials bring citizens together to gain group buying power for the purchase of competitively priced electricity from a retail electric generation supplier certified by the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO). Residents voted to allow the community to contract with an electric generation supplier on their behalf. Your community has selected Energy Harbor to provide you with exclusive pricing on your electric generation.

Who is Energy Harbor?

Energy Harbor is a fully integrated retail energy provider and independent power producer capable of generating substantial carbon-free energy. Headquartered in Akron, Ohio, the company proudly serves nearly one million residential, commercial, and industrial customers in Ohio, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland, Illinois and Michigan. Your community is one of over 200 who have chosen Energy Harbor to provide electric aggregation programs.

What does it mean to have a fixed price?

The price you will receive each month does not change.

How will I know if I can save money in the aggregation?

You'll know you are saving money as long as your price with Energy Harbor is lower than the utility Price to Compare (PTC) communicated on your bill.

Why am I receiving this letter if I'm in the aggregation?

As a current member of your community's electric aggregation program, you are given the opportunity to opt out of the program at least every three years. Whether your current contract term with Energy Harbor, or another supplier, is coming to an end, this is your opportunity to either opt out or continue the benefits of the program.

What does it mean to opt out?

Opt out means that you can decide to not participate in your community's electric aggregation program. If you chose to opt out via any of the methods indicated on the front of this notification, you will not be enrolled with Energy Harbor and will not receive further notifications until the end of the current term.

What happens if I do not opt out?

Whichever method you chose, you must do so by the Opt Out Deadline, or you will be automatically included in your community's electric aggregation program.

Can I opt out of the program at a later date?

Yes, you may leave the aggregation program at any time. You will not be charged an early termination or cancellation fee if you choose to leave the program at later date for any reason.

What are my energy supply choices if I decide to opt out?

If you opt out or leave the program at a later date you will be returned to your utility's standard service offer and might not be served under the same rates, terms, or conditions that apply to other customers served by the electric utility. You may also shop for an alternative generation supplier. A list of competitive electric suppliers certified by the PUCO and their current prices are available by calling 1-800-686-PUCO (7826).

¹As part of the aggregation, will Energy Harbor continue or allow me to begin to budget bill my supplier charges?

Yes. For customers in Toledo Edison, The Illuminating Company, Ohio Edison and Duke Energy your utility includes supplier charges in the monthly budgeted amount. No action is necessary to continue that service. In AEP Ohio and AES Ohio service areas, budget billing will automatically be provided to eligible residents who currently have budget billing with their utility and at least 10 months of historical usage at their current service address. If you have less than 10 months of usage, you will still receive the community exclusive pricing listed herein but will be ineligible to budget the generation portion of your bill. AEP Ohio and AES Ohio will continue to budget the delivery portion of your bill. Under budget billing service, Energy Harbor will calculate your budgeted amount based on your average electric usage over the prior months. Periodically, Energy Harbor may examine your budget and may adjust to more closely match your usage from the previous year. Energy Harbor will conduct a final true-up at the end of the contract - or upon your leaving the program should you 'opt out' before the program term end - to reconcile between the actual amount of electricity used and the amount paid under the plan. The new budget amount may vary from the level of your current budget payment. 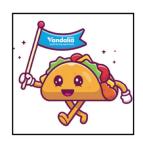




